

Susan P. Koniak has advised those involved in trading private mortgage backed securities and other complex derivatives as well as Board members at one of the GSE's, Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac. Along with John D. Geanakoplos, James Tobin Professor of Economics at Yale, she has developed a plan to facilitate the reworking of mortgages when reworking would yield more than foreclosing. She is a professor of law at Boston University, on leave; the author of many articles on the law governing lawyer, class actions, constitutional law, and the norms of private groups and organizations; and the author of several books, including The Law and Ethics of Lawyering, now in its 4th edition, co-authored by Geoffrey C. Hazard. Roger C. Cramton and George M. Cohen, After Enron's collapse, the Senate Judiciary Committee called her to testify on the responsibilities of lawyer whose corporate clients are engaged in fraud or other wrongdoing. She has also testified on the conduct of plaintiffs' lawyers in class actions before the House Judiciary Committee. She served, pro bono, as an expert witness for the plaintiffs in the Enron litigation, offering a report and testimony on the conduct of Enron's chief outside law firm, Vinson & Elkins. Professor Koniak has been a visiting professor at Yale's School of Management and at Cornell and Harvard law schools. She is a graduate of Yale Law School and New York University. She is also President of Sarah's Place GPS, a nonprofit organization dedicated to neurological research and helping those with unique neurological profiles.
